I will share them with you in the hope that they will help you as well. The words are selected in the texts recommended by Common Core. These context tipped tables are divided into three levels: These are the easiest context hint tables. These spreadsheets are designed to help students in difficulty or students in lower classes. They are written to help students read 3-6. Be sure to preview all materials before using them in your class. Context Clues Worksheet 1.1 This level one context tip worksheet covers 12 words that can be challenging for readers to start with. Students define each word based on context, and then explain their answers. Context Clues Worksheet 1.2 This level one context tip worksheet still has twelve contextual tips for students with the beginning of literacy. Level three These are the most difficult contextual tip tables. They are designed for students with advance reading and vocabulary skills. There are 12 challenging issues with this spreadsheet where students determine the meaning of a bold word based on the context of a sentence. Contextual cues are clues in a sentence that help good readers figure out the meanings of unknown words. When we look at the context of a word, we look at how it is used. Based on how these words are used, and in our knowledge of other words in a sentence, we make an enlightened prediction of what a challenging vocabulary word can mean. Example of using contextual tips Explore this line from Lewis Carroll's poem Jabberwocky. The frumious Bandersnatch! While grumpy or Bandersnatch weren't words before Carroll picked them, readers can take on meaning in structure based on what the words use. Reading the whole poem is a useful way to bring contextual tips to your students. Context Clues Climber Watch this free glossary video game.
